Through comprehensive data collection, 15 design sheets were meticulously curated, subsequently subjected to evaluation by 100 respondents who employed a grading system to identify the top 5 designs. Following this selection process, prototypes were meticulously developed and assessed using a 5-point rating system. The findings revealed a prevailing preference for designs that harmoniously merged traditional sugar skull motifs with contemporary elements, such as vibrant colors and modern silhouettes. This innovative approach sought to provide consumers with unique options, thus expanding the repertoire within the market segment

The sugar skulls are a sacrifice made to both the living and the dead. They serve as a reminder to ancestors that someone is thinking of them when they are placed on altars. They serve as a token of gratitude. The living are often gifted with these skulls as a token of appreciation. On the Day of the Dead, friends and relatives give sugar skulls to their loved ones as a token of their appreciation.

2. Objectives:

- 1. To research current trends in the industry for Indo-Western clothing.
- 2. Finding out what the target demographic wants in terms of clothing design
- 3. To enhance the design of Indo-Western clothing items' marketability and acceptance

3. Delimitation:

- 1. The fabric used is exclusively silk and georgette.
- 2. Only designs with sugar skulls were included in the study.

4. Methodology

4.3. Tools and procedure for data collection: The study was carried out in stages in order to achieve the particular goals. Every aim was built with a different set of tools. The following describes the process that comes after data collecting under these phases:

4.3.1. **Phase 1**

The phase-1 of the study consisted of-

- (a) Collection of study material: The majority of the study materials and information came from books, magazines, the internet, and market surveys. The primary focus of the surveys was on the materials, shapes, colors, adornment materials, and color threads that were readily available in the market for fashion.
- **(b) Data collection:** Once the data was gathered, it was subjectively or artistically assessed to determine consumer preferences about the design enrichment approach, sugar skull motives, etc.

4.3.2. Phase 2

- (a) Collection of Sugar skull design: Various skull designs and motifs were gathered for the study from various online and print sources, including books.
- **(b) Selection of design:** -A larger number of the gathered designs and motifs was utilized for the design sketching.
- (c) **Sketching of Designs:** To avoid specific tastes for color, the chosen designs were sketched in black on white paper.

4.3.3. Phase 3

- (a) **Development of Design sheets on paper:** Only fifteen design sheets with specific motifs and designs were created.
- (b) For an accurate assessment A sample of one hundred respondents was chosen from the Chandigarh group of colleges in Jhanjeri. The target sample's design sheets were assessed using a 5-point rating system.

Evaluation of developed design sheets on 5- point scale:

A five point was used for rating as given below-

The total points awarded to every design were tallied, and the top five designs—enriched western clothing adorned with a sugar skull motif—were displayed to observe the final result.

This stage involved the process used to create Indo-Western clothing designs with stitched sugar skull motifs. This article discusses the process required to complete embroidery on silk or georgette fabric for indo-western clothing. Here, silk or georgette cloth was bought from Mohali.

4.3.5. **Phase 5**

The facts about the assessment of the designed prototype should be quantified. On a five-point rating system, the design with the highest score was ranked first based on factors such as marketability, appropriateness, aesthetic appeal, and color decoration.

5. Result

The created Indo-Western outfit by Sugar Skull Motives was evaluated for consumer appeal and market value. The replies from the respondents regarding the sugar skull embroidery motives were judged to be fair to excellent. Responses to the color scheme were ranked from good to excellent; similarly, the aesthetic effect of the created Indo-Western clothing was rated from good to excellent, and the aesthetic effect of the designed motifs was rated from good to excellent. Research results indicated that indo- western clothing with embroidered sugar skull designs was deemed aesthetically acceptable and appealing.

The respondents were ready to add these particular indo-western clothes to their closet, according to an analysis of market acceptance for designed sugar skull clothing. The majority of respondents said they would be ready to pay the estimated cost of a designed outfit.

5. Results and Discussion

5.1 Results

The study focused on evaluating Indo-Western dresses featuring sugar skull motifs, assessing their appeal, marketability, and aesthetic value. A total of 15 design sheets were developed and evaluated by 100 respondents, who rated the designs based on a 5-point scale. The top 5 designs were selected for further prototype development and evaluation.

5.1.1 Design Evaluation

Each design sheet was rated by respondents according to five parameters: design, color, applicability, embellishment, and aesthetic effect. The data collected provided the following insights:

- **Design Preferences:** The designs incorporating sugar skull motifs were generally well-received. The top five designs were noted for their successful integration of traditional motifs with modern aesthetics, such as vibrant colors and contemporary silhouettes. For instance, Design No. 5 received the highest total score of 413 points, indicating strong approval from respondents. This design's success can be attributed to its effective blend of sugar skull motifs with appealing color schemes and modern cuts.
- Color Schemes: The color schemes used in the designs were evaluated as ranging from good to excellent. Design No. 4, with a score of 75% for color, demonstrated that vibrant and bold colors are highly preferred in the context of sugar skull motifs. This highlights a consumer preference for dynamic and eye-catching color palettes in Indo-Western fashion.
- **Applicability and Embellishment:** The applicability of the designs to various occasions was rated positively. Design No. 3 scored 70% for applicability, reflecting its versatility in different social contexts. Similarly, embellishment techniques used in the prototypes received favorable ratings, with Design No. 2 and Design No. 4 showing strong performance in terms of embroidery quality and detailing.
